
### Campus Involvement:

At Colorado State University, student organizations are a way for students to not only find a community of people with shared interests and make friends, but also a place to learn more about their career field, make a difference on campus, and step into leadership roles. For example, a student might serve as the Treasurer for a student

organization where they will gain skills in financial management, teamwork, leadership, and decision-making. These skills and experiences are highly valued by employers. **The Student Leadership, Involvement and Community Engagement** office works to connect students with campus organizations and community involvement opportunities based on their interests. Students can schedule a one-on-one appointment with a peer **involvement advisor** to discover the many involvement opportunities available.

## Working on Campus:

Working on campus can provide students with relevant skills, flexible hours, and a sense of community. The best way to find on campus jobs is through **Handshake**. There are two types of employment on campus:




### Work-study:




## Internships:

An internship is a practical work experience related to a student's major or career interest. They are opportunities where students can learn how to apply classroom knowledge in a work setting, establish connections that could lead to future jobs, and gain relevant work experience that will give a competitive edge to a resume. Some companies look to hire a majority of their interns into full-time positions so an internship can be a great stepping stone into working for a particular company. Internships are also a great way for students to learn more about their chosen field and if it is a good fit for them. The Career Center is available to help students find internship opportunities, develop application materials, and has a program to financially support students who pursue an **unpaid internship**.

## Volunteering:

Through volunteering students can meet people of different ages in various professions and expand their community. Because there are so many types of volunteer work, it can be a great way for a student who is still exploring their career path to learn more about what interests them. Volunteering by definition is unpaid, however many feel a sense of purpose through giving back.
